ADJECTIVE / ADVERB

The Subject

Recognize the subject of a sentence when you see one.

- The subject is always a **noun** or a **pronoun**.

Noun- person, place or thing

Pronoun - I, you, he, she, it, we, they, someone, nobody, something

(they always replace a noun)

- The subject does the action of the verb.
- Usually the subject comes before the verb.

To find the subject, first find the verb. Then find who or what did that action.

Tommy danced on the table.

Danced is the verb. *Who* danced? **Tommy**.
